Instructor Joan Swiderski notes, "Parents report that their children are more engaged at home and several have mentioned big gains in their interactions with others." We consider this a huge success, especially with the limitations imposed during the COVID crisis.

We were blessed to have been introduced to Special Equestrians 8 years ago for my son, Adam, who is now a confident rider. His first word was actually on a horse during his therapeutic riding session. He reached his hand out to touch the horse's neck and said "Baby". The horses made such a powerful connection with Adam, which helped him evolve into a more verbal child with Autism.

Adam continues to ride today along with his 2 siblings and it has made an immense impact on all of them. Ilyas, who is 8 absolutely loves riding along with his brother and sister. It is a healing experience to do something so positive and loving with his siblings.

My daughter, Sofia is 4. She has developmental delays and does not walk, however when you see this frail, young child ride a horse, sitting up so straight and confident, you would never know that she has the delays and challenges that she faces.

Horses have been a life-saver for my children who have unfortunately had to deal with many adversities that typical children do not usually struggle with. Special Equestrians has been a blessing for our family and we are so fortunate to have had our experience with them.

Horse Scoop

Our barn stables 8 horses of various breeds. It takes a special horse to become a therapeutic riding horse! A good equine candidate will be from 14 to 15.2 hands, have smooth gaits, and is in their early to mid-teens. They must possess a good, even temperament, be willing and forgiving. A therapy horse must be able to tolerate unbalanced riders and unclear movements or cues. The good ones just seem to KNOW their jobs! They are patient and unflappable.

Our horses receive regular vaccinations, farrier and dental care as well as appropriate feed, hay and turn out. We are always on the lookout for prospective therapy horses!
